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

On this day we are asked to remember in our prayers those who have left our shores and also those who have joined us here in our parishes from overseas. Let us remember in a special way those migrants whose journeys were filled with fear, trepidation and hostility. In particular, let us remember the elderly Irish community in Britain, the undocumented in the United States and Irish prisoners overseas. Closer to home we remember those who are the victims of racism, human trafficking and those living in the direct provision system.
