At Mass we listen to the Word of God and respond to it The Liturgy of the Word is that part of the Mass that takes place at the lectern or pulpit, properly called the Ambo. The most important part is the

Gospel, preceded by the Alleluia, for


which we stand. The first reading

usually gives some Old Testament background to the Gospel. The Psalm is our answer or response to the first reading. The second reading is usually from one of St. Paul's letters, is unrelated to the others and is sometimes omitted. The homily is the priest's attempt to relate the Word of God to everyday life. The Creed which follows is a statement of the truths we believe. The Liturgy of the Word ends with the Prayer of the Faithful.

We can best join in the Liturgy of the Word by listening carefully to the scriptures, especially the Gospel, and by joining in the Creed and the response to the psalm



We do not live on bread alone. It is only Christ who can satisfy the hunger that we all feel for God. The Lord feeds us with the Eucharist, just as in times past he fed the people of Israel with manna from heaven. Through this act of God's love we can learn that the Lord is indeed our God.



Manna from Heaven

Manna was the supernatural food God gave to the Israelites during their 40-year wandering in the desert. The word manna means "What is it?" in Hebrew. Not long after the Jewish people had escaped Egypt and crossed the Red Sea, they ran out of the food they had brought with them. They began to grumble, recalling the tasty meals they had enjoyed when they were slaves. God told Moses he would rain down bread from heaven for the people. That evening quail came and covered the camp. The people killed the birds and ate their meat. The next morning, when the dew evaporated, a white substance covered the ground. The Bible describes manna as white like coriander seed and tasting like wafers made with honey.
