Return of Public Celebration of Mass

A special word of thanks to the Covid-19 committees in both Ballinamuck and Drumlish for the tremendous work they have done and continue to do in regards to signage and preparing the Churches for the return of Masses. The people on these committees are giving of their time and energy and I ask all to give them your full support and cooperation and also to offer your services when and where possible. The 'new normal' is a very strange experience for us all and requires charity, patience and understanding on behalf of all.

 To help lessen the pressure on weekend Masses. I ask that the elderly and those retired to attend the weekday mass and keep the Saturday/Sunday Masses free for those who are working and unable to avail of the weekday Masses.

I remind you again that the Sunday obligation to attend Mass doesn't apply during these days, but if you still wish to meet that obligation you can do so by attending any of the week day Masses.

 Those attending Mass in Drumlish/Ballinamuck are asked to sign in, using the book provided at the main entrance. This is to insure traceability in the event of anyone contracting the Covid-19 virus. When attending Mass, please observe the following guidelines:

Wash your hands before and after attending Mass

- Sanitise your hands as you enter and leave Church Observe social distancing, as marked
- Wearing a face cover/mask is recommended
- Enter by main door and Exit by side doors
- Offerings/Envelopes should be placed in the basket in front of altar at end of Mass on exiting.
- When receiving Holy Communion, please come seat by seat, starting at the front and returning by the side passages, while observing social distance. Thank you for your cooperation and keep safe.



Ballinamuck Footpath



Confirmation & First Communion

- * This year Confirmation will administered by the Parish Priest of each parish. Confirmation in this parish will be for 6th Class only and as follows: Drumlish on Thursday 30th July at 11 a.m. & 1 p.m. Ballinamuck on Friday 31st July at 12.00 a.m. Its important to remember that restrictions continue regarding numbers attending and social distancing.
- * First Holy Communion will take place in Ballinamuck at 11 a.m. on Saturday 12th September and in Drumlish on Saturday 19th Sept. at 11 a.m.

Detailed Covid-19 Guidance has been developed for religious services. The Cabinet Committee reviewed the guidance, which state that an assessment should be carried out for each premises to determine how many can attend within the requirements of social distancing. The Cabinet Committee decided that where the size of the premises allows for a capacity of greater than 50 this may be permitted only where:

Places of Worship—Recent Government Update

- Social distancing guidelines are adhered to.
- The premises can be subdivided into distinct sections (cordoned or marked appropriately) of not more than 50 persons in each section • There is a minimum of 4m between sections
- Each section having its own entrance/exit route
- There are separate arrangements for elements of the service involving close contact, e.g. the distribution of Holy Communion
- Strictly no movement of people between sections before, during or after the service
- The premises is well-ventilated.

Account must also be taken regarding the risk of congregation by people outside before and after any services, having regard to outdoor overall limits on mass gatherings and arrangements for staggered exiting after ceremonies. The use of face coverings is strongly recommended for such indoor settings.

Note: in view of those new regulations, particularly relating to 'subdivisions' it is not possible for now to increase the capacity of our two churches in Drumlish & Ballinamuck beyond the number 50.
